Previous Question: How is our Daughter Parish, Holy Ascension, doing way down there in West Chester?

Answer: This is Fr. Daniel Meyer, pastor at Holy Ascension; one of your daughter parishes! I have had the pleasure of meeting a number of you over the past three years, and have been blessed to have Fr. Noah, Fr. James, and Fr. Boniface as dear brothers in Christ.

As many of you know, Holy Ascension was founded 11 years ago, from 40 St. Philip's parishioners living in that area. After renting a number of different facilities, and purchasing vacant land in 2006,



we acquired 6 beautiful acres in West Chester with an existing building for worship in 2010. Since then we have been seeking God's will for us, and after much planning and prayers, we were able to sell our vacant property just a few weeks ago. We now have our sights set on developing our West Chester church campus with a long-term vision so that we might more widely open our doors to those non-Orthodox in our surrounding neighborhoods.

We have been busy continuing to develop our liturgical life. Our choir and chanters continue to study and rehearse so that they might lead our people in the worship of the Holy Trinity. Sunday school classes continue, and we were gladly surprised to find that our Sunday School children's attendance is at 45 children this year, just under half of our entire lay community! Over the past year we have seen a significant rise in inquirers as a result of college students coming out from two local universities.

We treasure you all. Please remember us in your prayers.

Baby Steps to Biblical Literacy:

Old Testament – Exodus through Deuteronomy

We are continuing to read for understanding the Old Testament. The books of Exodus through Deuteronomy tell the story of the Hebrews' exit from Egyptian bondage to the cusp of their entry into the Holy Land under the leadership of Moses. This is a most important section of the Scriptures for us because it prefigures Christ's coming as the new law-giver, the one who "spreads a table in the wilderness," and the prophet, priest, and king leading his people out of spiritual slavery. As you read through these books of the Bible, try to understand the Who, What, When, Where, Why, and How of the following people and events in the books:

Exodus: Moses, the Burning Bush, the Ten Plagues, the Passover, the Exodus, the Pillar of Fire, the Waters of Marah, Manna, Quail, the Rock, Amalek, Jethro, Sinai, the Ten Commandments, the Law of God, the Tabernacle, the Priesthood, Worship.

Leviticus: The Offerings, the Ordination of Aaron and his Sons, Purity Laws, the Yearly Feasts.

Numbers: Numbering the Tribes, Organization, the Spies, Failed Invasion, Rebellion, Tithes, the Copper Servant, Balaam, Cities of Refuge.

Deuteronomy: Moses not entering the promised land, the second giving of the law, Joshua, Moses' Death.

Many people are overwhelmed by the detail of these books, but take this opportunity to learn of God's concern for details and His providence in leading His people through the wilderness.
