- **Great Vespers** is a beautiful, peaceful service that prepares our hearts for the Divine Liturgy through its theologically rich hymns. It is a great service to bring someone to for the first time.

Baby Steps to Holiness

January: Say the Jesus Prayer Constantly

We all want peace and joy. These are elusive goals until we discover and use the key!

The key is right in front of us: "pray without ceasing!" (1 Thessalonians 5:17)

As a child or a young man, I might have thought of this as boring. But now, when I am on top of it, it is a source of great joy and peace for me. If God is with us, who can be against us? If we are clinging to heavenly joy, how can we be sour?



How do I start? Ask for God's help, consciously remember His presence and love, and then under your breath, say: "Lord, Jesus Christ, have mercy on me," or another form of the Jesus Prayer. Whenever you notice that you've stopped saying the prayer, just start again!


It will start as a struggle, develop into a habit, and flourish as an eternal joy!

(1 Thessalonians 5)**

This prescription from St. Paul to the Christians in Thessalonica (1 Thess. 5:17) is just as important for us today. Always Keep God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit, and all the saints and angels and your family and parish before your mind's eye. Truly remember God and remember to constantly ask and thank Him for his help, guidance, protection, blessing, and love. Let's do this together with the Jesus Prayer: "Lord, Jesus Christ, have mercy on me."

Answer: The annual house blessing by the priest is an ancient and venerable practice. It is a joy and also a duty of the clergy and parishioners. But, it is much more than that. It is an opportunity for our homes and families to be taken back from our laziness and evil influences and reclaimed for God.

Our homes are mini-churches, the Micro-Ecclesia, and the arena of our spiritual warfare. If don't feel desperate to invite God's holiness into our lives, to save us from slow slipping away from God, then we aren't really living the Christian life of struggle, repentance, prayer, ministry, and spiritual growth.
