Baby Steps to Holiness

July - Bite Your Tongue and Keep Smiling

We are all tempted to "say it as it is" (or at least as we think it is) to that person who gets under our skin. We are deceived into thinking that it will make things better, help the other person, or at least help us feel better. But we know that it doesn't help. In fact, we end up digging ourselves into deeper and deeper holes, isolating ourselves from the very people that God has brought into our life.

But there is a better way! We don't have to say anything. Elder Porphyrios of Greece says, "Words hammer the ears but prayer hammers the heart." That means we will be more effective if we pray about our problems than if we go in bull-headedly to "give it to him!" We are all going through a great battle, but we don't have to share that battle with everyone. In fact, we should keep our struggles to ourselves and a trusted guide and friend. That is what confession is for; that is what parents, Godparents, best friends, siblings and spouses are for.

Previous Question: Why is going to church necessary if God is everywhere?

Answer: God is in the world, holding it together by the presence of His Holy Spirit. We must pray to God constantly, ceaselessly and rejoice in His Presence all the time. And yet there is a particular place and time which God has directed His people to gather to praise Him. It is an invitation to a fore-taste of Heaven. We are called to transcend the man-in-Heaven paradigm.

There is sense of the "scandal of particularity." Just as God choose a particular nation to be a blessing for the world, and a particular Man to be the salvation of the world, so too He directs particular times and places and styles for his blessing.

From the akathist hymn that is chanted before the miraculous Iveron icon.

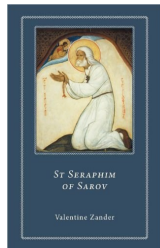

Book Recommendation

St Seraphim of Sarov
by Valentine Zander



Orthodox spirituality has produced many holy and famous men, but none in recent centuries to compare with Seraphim, staretz of the monastery of Sarov. After an initial period as a monk, working with the community, he was led to become a hermit, living deep in the forest in a world of solitude which was only destroyed when he was attacked by brigands. He returned to the community and in 1825, after fifteen years in silence, he began to receive visitors again and to spend his energies in their spiritual

direction. By means of his faith and asceticism he performed a number of miracles. His fame and humility brought a steady stream of visitors, religious and royalty alike, to him for advice. His humility and concern for people made Sarov a center of pilgrimage until the events of the 1917 revolution. Zander has constructed this biography from the notebooks of people who knew him, the nuns whose spiritual director he became, the people whose lives he influenced, and the clergy who sought his advice. She adds to this information her own recollections of pilgrimages to Sarov before 1917. The life of the staretz is told with a touching simplicity which allows his life and work to be their own witnesses. All four books help to illumine the spiritual tradition so faithfully embodied in St Seraphim.
