Challenge for 2017: **Be led by the Spirit, not pushed by the passions** (Romans 8:12-14)

Abba John the Dwarf said, "If a king wanted to take possession of his enemy's city, he would begin by cutting off the water and the food and so his enemies, dying of hunger, would submit to him. It is the same with the passions of the flesh: if a man goes about fasting and hungry the enemies of his soul grow weak."

This beautiful little passage gives us a clear demonstration of why fasting is essential to our life in Christ. We fast for many reasons (prayer, obedience, generosity, physical health, as well as being "poor in spirit") including regaining control of our souls and bodies. Let's continue the fast with the prayer: Lord, lead us by your Holy Spirit out of the bondage to the passions that have enslaved us.

Lay siege to your soul, starve your spiritual enemies, and let God reign as King on the throne of your heart!

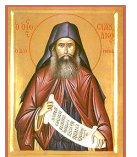

- The information at our fingertips on our phones is a cheap substitute for the **wisdom** that wells up in our hearts in prayer and silence.

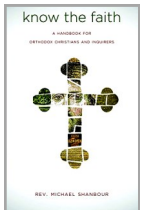


Book Recommendation

This is an excellent catechetical and apologetic handbook which unfolds through the eyes of a convert of the earliest days of the church.

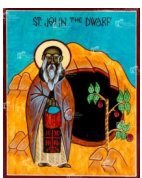


Wisdom

Previous Question: I become distracted in Church; how can I concentrate?

Answer: This is something I struggle with constantly, too. Generally, I try to follow the readings, prayers, hymns, and homilies. But, sometimes I catch myself thinking about this or that thought. Whether our thoughts are good or bad, they are not appropriate in Church because we come to Church to pray and enter into the heavenly worship of God.

If the distraction is external (an immodestly dressed parishioner, boisterous child, heavy incense) we can physically move ourselves to a more peaceful place. Or sometimes we must look at the beautiful iconography to dislodge an image from our minds. Some thoughts are a cue to pray for who or what concerns us.

Sometimes, thank God, we are able to concentrate on the service very well. Other times, however, when we are plagued by thoughts, we need to take up the "Sword of the Spirit" which is the "Word of God," Jesus Christ. The Jesus Prayer, "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me" is, perhaps, the most effective way block the thoughts and focus more deeply on Christ.

Often, when we are praying more outside of Church, our experience in Church is more blessed by God. In fact, "what I get out of church" is a barometer of my own spiritual life, rather than the incidental questions of performance: "how was the choir?" "the homily?" These things are important offerings to God and to each other, but they must not overshadow the reality of the "work of God's people," the Liturgy: we are mystically but truly joining the heavenly hosts in worshipping at the Throne of the Almighty God (Hebrews 12:22ff) and we partake of Christ's very Body and Blood.

Let us struggle, then, to let nothing separate us from the love of Christ! As we approach the church in our cars, begin asking God for a prayerful service.

This is a perennial problem that the disciples of Christ had too. Let's take up that most humble prayer: "Lord, teach us to pray!"
